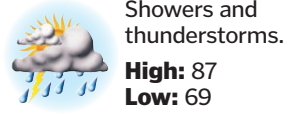

## Atlanta rider wins Grand Prix 2nd time at show

**MORELAND HILLS** — Taylor Land says she will return for the Cleveland Grand Prix at next summer's Chagrin Hunter Jumper Classic.

History suggests that is a wise decision.

Land, from Atlanta, rode Liroy 30, a 9-year-old German sport horse, to a first-place finish in Sunday's Grand Prix at the Cleveland Metroparks Polo Field.

Land had competed at the Grand Prix just once before, in 2009 when she was 17, and finished second.

"I love Chagrin," said Land, who spent the

last week at the Classic with her father, Jay, and mother, Kim.

"It has beautiful riding trails and is a beau-

tiful city. I definitely will be back. It's a wonderful show."

Land's parents both competed at the Grand

Prix in the 1980s. She was among four of 27 riders who advanced to the championship jump-off round before an estimated crowd of 4,000.

Land finished the 16-obstacle, first-round course in one minute and 22.086 seconds, then won the jump-off by completing the eight-fence course in 42.760 seconds.

Land, 26, earned \$15,000 from the overall \$50,000 Grand Prix prize money.

She and runner-up Lauren Hester, of Lexington, Kentucky, did not have a fault (making contact with or knocking over a fence) in either round.

## Embattled congressman making no concessions

**WASHINGTON** — Wrestling wasn't just a youth sport for Rep. Jim Jordan. It's central to the Ohio Republican's identity.

When Jordan floated himself as a candidate for House speaker, his allies cited his history on the wrestling mat as a reason for how tough and serious he would take the race. "If Congressman Jordan decides to run, just like he did when he was a

two-time national champion wrestler, I don't think he's going to run for last," Rep. Mark Meadows, Republican of North Carolina, a close ally, said the day after Speaker Paul Ryan, Republican of Wisconsin, announced plans to retire.

A visit to Jordan's campaign website finds this

opening statement: "Jim Jordan's background as a four-time state champion and two-time NCAA champion in the sport of wrestling helped prepare him to take on some of the toughest political opponents in Washington."

## Payday lending bill: Who wins, who loses?

Dozens of people — both in and outside Ohio — worked hard for and against a bill restricting payday lending, which passed the Ohio Senate on Tuesday.

House Bill 123 is poised to become law, although it still needs a final sign-off from the Ohio House, which won't meet again until at least September. Then it would head to Gov. John Kasich for his signature.

The bill limits payday

loans' interest rates to 28 percent.

Interest rates have no limit today because payday lenders skirted interest rate requirements from 2008 and register under a part of Ohio law that doesn't cap interest or fees.

The Pew Charitable Trusts says Ohio's average interest rate is the nation's highest at 591 percent, a figure the industry disputes.

So who wins and who loses under the new restrictions?
